Note.—During the period 1st October to 31st March Mails from Hobart and Launceston for Blue Tier, Blue Tier Junction, Falmouth, Goshen, Gould's Country, St. Helen's, and Weldborough are forwarded per Morning Trains, and therefore close on T. Th. Sat. at 7 a.m. and 6'30 p.m.

On every letter or packet redirected and again forwarded from one Colony to another (except on letters and packets addressed to commissioned officers or warrant officers whether in the Army or Navy, or midshipmen or mates of the Navy, or other parties actually in Her Majesty's service) there shall be charged for the postage thereof from the place at which the same shall be redirected to the place of ultimate delivery the same amount of postage in addition to the ordinary postage as would be payable if such letter or packet were originally posted at the place of redirection.

Prepayment of Postage.

The postage upon all letters, packets, and newspapers should be prepaid by affixing stamps thereon. The stamps must be affixed upon the outside of all letters above the address written upon them, as by "The Post Office Act" no Postmaster is bound to take notice of or pass any stamp affixed to any other part of a letter.

### Licences to sell Stamps.

The Postmaster-General grants licences to sell stamps to respectable persons, if it is satisfactorily proved that the issue of such licence is for the convenience of the public.

### Unpaid and Insufficiently-paid Letters, &c.

Unpaid or insufficiently paid letters are sent on to destination and are charged on delivery with double the deficient postage due thereon.

Packets addressed to the Australasian Colonies, Fiji, Hong Kong, Mauritius, or the United Kingdom, provided one rate of postage is paid, are forwarded to destination and charged on delivery with double the deficient postage, but packets wholly unpaid or prepaid less than one rate are not sent. Packets insufficiently prepaid, addressed to other places than those above mentioned, are not sent. Packets not sent are forwarded to the Dead Letter Office, whence they are returned to the senders.

Newspapers unpaid or insufficiently paid are not sent.

### Special Request Letters.

All inland letters having the names and addresses of the senders thereof printed or written on the address side of the envelopes with a request that such letters be returned if not claimed or delivered within a stated period, will be returned from the General Post Office at the expiration of such period to the writers or senders thereof.

NOTE.—Postmasters are requested to pay strict attention to the above rule, and return under cover to the Secretary, General Post Office, such letters as may remain unclaimed at the expiration of the period endorsed thereon.

### LATE LETTERS.

Late letters for inland and ship mails are charged at a uniform fee of 2d each. This regulation applies also to loose letters sent to or from any other Australian Colony in the ship's box or bag, the deficiency in default being charged at the destination of such letters. On English mail days at Hobart (when the mail closes at 6 p.m.) letters for the United Kingdom and Victoria only may be posted until 7 p.m., at an extra fee of 6d. each.

### POST CARDS.

Post Cards having a One Penny Stamp printed or impressed by the Postmaster-General are transmitted between places in the Colony, and also to the other Australasian Colonies, under the following conditions:

There must be nothing written or printed on the front other than the address, nor any writing or printing across the stamp. On the reverse any communication may be written or printed, but nothing whatever may be attached, nor may the card be folded, cut, or in any respect altered.

No stamp cut from a Post Card will be accepted in payment of other

Postage.

No Card other than those issued by the Post Office Department will be permitted to pass at One Penny if bearing on it a written communication of the nature of a letter.

Should a Post Cord be observed to bear upon it anything of an obscene, libellous, or otherwise obviously objectionable nature, it may

be detained and destroyed.

When owing to a great and unusual influx of letters, &c., the transmission or delivery of the letters would be delayed if the whole mail were dealt with without distinction, Post Cards may be kept back until the next despatch or delivery.

### BOOK AND PACKET REGULATIONS.

### PREPARATION FOR POST.

Packets may be sent through the post:-

Without a cover (but not fastened with anything adhesive, such as

gum, postage stamp, sealing wax, &c.):

In a cover entirely open at one end or side (if the cover be slit, the opening must be of the full extent of the end or side, and the contents must be easy of withdrawal).

The cover must bear the sender's name and address, and the

description of contents endorsed thereon.

Packets may be tied with string, but officers of the department may cut the string to examine the contents, and tie the packet up again.

Samples of seeds, drugs, &c., which cannot be sent as open packets, may be enclosed in bags or boxes, fastened so as to be easily undone and re-fastened. If addressed to places in the Colony or the United Kingdom, they may be sent in closed transparent bags.

Note.—If the above conditions be not complied with, the packets are regarded as insufficiently paid letters, and charged accordingly.

### WEIGHT AND DIMENSIONS OF PACKETS.

### Weight.

Not to exceed 3 lbs.; but if conveyed by horse-post the weight should not exceed 1 lb.

### Dimensions.

No packet to exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in breadth or depth, or to be of inconvenient form.

(The rule regarding dimensions of a packet not to apply to packets bearing a frank stamp and marked "On Public Service only.")

posted bearing the packet rate of postage, they will be treated as

insufficiently paid letters.

Officers of the Post Office may examine the contents of any package for the purposes of ascertaining whether they are in accordance with these regulations; but such officers must securely refasten any packet so opened.

### ARTICLES NOT ALLOWED TO BE SENT AS PACKETS.

Gold or silver money, jewels or precious articles, or anything liable to Customs duty, addressed to any country in the Postai Union, except the United Kingdom, to which latter place such articles may be forwarded if paid letter rate and registered.

Glass, and perishable substances such as game, fish, flesh, fruit,

vegetables. &c.

Anything liable to injure the person of any officer of the Post Office, or the contents of a mail.

Photographs on glass, when not in strong cases. Anything sealed or fastened against inspection.

Anything in the nature of a letter, unless wholly printed or lithographed, &c.

Packets bearing on the outside or containing any profane, obscene, or libellous address, signature, picture, or thing.

Packets posted in fraud or violation of the Postal or Customs law.

### Books.

The following and similar articles are forwarded at book rate of 1d. per 4 ozs. by the Inland post and to the Australasian Colonies and

Printed Books, Pamphlets, Magazines, Reviews, and all other periodical publications that do not come within the definition of Newspapers, Printed Music (bound or loose), Photographs, &c., bound and published in book form.

Parcels not to exceed 3 lbs. in weight.

No articles of merchandise can be forwarded to Queensland but such as are sent as bond fide patterns or samples, having no intrinsic value of their own except as patterns or samples.

### NEWSPAPERS:—RATES OF POSTAGE, REGULATIONS, &c.

1. Newspapers printed and posted in the Colony for delivery at any place within the Colony beyond the boundaries of the City or Town at which they may be published, and posted within seven days from the date of publication.....

2. Newspapers printed and posted in the Colony for transmission to the Australian Colonies and to New Zealand, if posted within seven days from the date of publication

3. Newspapers printed and posted in the Colony after seven days from the date of publication.....

4. Newspapers posted to any place other than Tasmania, the Australian Colonies, or New Zealand..... Free.

5. Newspapers posted within any city, town, or district in the Colony for delivery by letter carriers within such city, town, or district.....

6. Newspapers received from places beyond the limits of the Colony shall be delivered free; but when re-posted, whether in single numbers or stitched monthly parts of two or more numbers, shall be subject to a charge for each number.....

 $\frac{1}{2}d$ . each.

7. Bulk parcels of newspapers posted by a registered newspaper publisher or newsvendor (no parcel containing less than six newspapers to pass at bulk rates), per pound or fraction thereof .....

8. The Hobart Gazette, published by the Government Printer, is exempted from the above rates, and may be posted for delivery in any part of the Colony, or for transmission out of the Colony, free of charge.

9. Newspapers liable to postage must be fully prepaid by affixing

stamps of sufficient value.

### REGULATIONS.

Any publication coming within the following description shall be

deemed a newspaper :--

Any publication consisting wholly or in great part of political or other news, or of articles relating thereto, or to other current topics, with or without advertisements, shall be deemed a newspaper, provided that it be printed and published in numbers at intervals of not more than one month, that it have the full title and date of publication printed at the top of the first page, and the whole or part of the title and the date of publication printed at the top of every subsequent page, (this applies also to "Tables of Contents" and "Indices"), with or without a supplement, consisting wholly or in great part of such matter as aforesaid, or of advertisements, printed on paper stitched or unstitched, or consisting wholly or in part of engravings, prints, or lithographs illustrative of articles in the paper. It must in every case be published with the newspaper, and having the title and date of publication of the newspaper printed at the top of every page, or, if it consists of engravings, prints, or lithographs, at the top of every sheet or side. Handbills or advertisement sheets are not supplements.

Collected numbers of any publication registered as a newspaper shall not be transmitted through the post as a single newspaper, but postage

will be charged on each number of issue comprised therein.

Every newspaper posted in Tasmania must be sent without a cover, or enclosed in a cover open at both ends, and there shall not be in or upon any such newspaper or the cover thereof any printing, writing, or thing whatsoever other than the contents of such newspaper as printed by the publisher thereof, and the printed or written name and address of sender thereof, excepting only the direction on the outside thereof or any mark intended to call attention to any paragraph therein.

Any breach of the foregoing provisions will render the person con-

victed liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds.

21. Letters on matters in connection with the Tasmanian University, franked by either the Chancellor (Sir Lambert Dobson), Vice-Chancellor (Rev. Geo. Clarke), or Registrar (Geo. Richardson, Esq.)

22. Printed Cards notifying to Members of Rifle Clubs to attend

Inspections, Drills, or Riffe Practice.

23. Communications addressed to or by the Chief Inspector, Sub-Inspectors, and Chairmen of Boards under the "Codlin Moth Act, 1887," if endorsed with the words "Codlin Moth Act," and bearing the signature of the sender.

24. Parcels containing Insects or Fungi, addressed to Rev. E. H. Thompson, Franklin, if such parcels be marked "Insect or Fungus Specimens only," and bear the name and address of the sender.

Note.—The particular attention of all Postmasters is called to the circumstance of no Public Officer being allowed to receive Letters or Packets "On Public Service only" free, unless they be franked by a Member of Parliament, or by the Mayor or Warden of a Municipality, or one or other of the Officers to whom the Governor has granted the privilege of franking; or unless they be from a subordinate Officer to the Head of his Department; or from the Police to the Head of any Department or to Police authorities. All Letters or Packets from other parties, unless prepaid by means of Postage Stamps, must therefore be dealt with as "Unstamped," or "Insufficiently Stamped," as the case may be, unless they come under one or other of the exemptions from postage above set forth. No Letter or Packet exceeding 2 lbs. in weight can be forwarded unless under the express authority of the Hon. the Treasurer, or when franked by a Minister of the Crown; but this does not apply to Packets to and from any Member of Parliament, or Clerk of either House of Parliament, to and from the Auditor-General, and to and from the Government Printer.

### PRIVATE BOXES.

Locked Private Boxes, of three sizes, as required, are provided at the General Post Office, Hobart, for merchants and others, on payment of £1 1s., £1 11s. 6d., or £2 2s. per annum in advance, according to the size of the box required.

Payment of Box Fees to date from the 1st January; but, to suit the convenience of persons requiring boxes from the 1st April, 1st July, or 1st October, payment in advance, at the annual rate for the period—nine, six, or three months—will be received.

A key is supplied with each box (when let) without extra charge,

but 2s. 6d. will be charged for each additional key supplied.

When a key is lost information should at once be given to the Secretary, General Post Office, and a new lock will be fitted to the box, and fresh key supplied, for which a charge of 7s. 6d. will be made.

Holders of Private Boxes are supplied daily with a Mail Notice

gratis.

The attention of holders of Private Boxes is specially directed to the advisability of checking all the letters taken from the box, and any that may accidentally have been missorted therein should at once be handed to an officer of the Post Office for disposal.

### PRIVATE MAIL BAGS.

Private Mail Bags are supplied to persons requiring them who reside on the route travelled by a Mail Contractor, upon payment in advance of a fee of £1 1s. per annum. Mail Contractors are bound under their contracts to convey and deliver free of charge all bags given to them, but are not required to deviate from the usual mail route, and are on no account to be delayed.

Letters forwarded in private bags for delivery at the Post Office at which such bags are opened must bear postage at the rate of 2d. per

### GENERAL ARRANGEMENTS.

### DELIVERIES BY LETTER CARRIERS.

There are three town deliveries daily in Hobart—viz., at 8·15 A.M., 1 P.M., and 4 P.M. On Saturdays, at 8·15 A.M. and 1 P.M. only.

In Launceston there are four deliveries daily—at 9 A.M., 10 A.M., 2 P.M., and 4 P.M.; and on Saturdays, two, at 9 A.M. and 1 P.M.

Suburban Deliveries.—Letters, &c. are delivered in the Hobart Suburbs of New Town, Sandy Bay, and Cascade Road, leaving the General Post Office as follows:—New Town, 7 A.M. and 2 P.M.; Sandy Bay, 9 A.M., 1 P.M., and 4 P.M., Saturday, 9 A.M. and 1 P.M. only; Cascade Road, 9 A.M. and 4 P.M. Also in the Launceston suburb of Inveresk, extending to the Post Office at Invermay, leaving the Post Office at Launceston at 9 A.M. and 2 P.M.

The Letter Delivery Office is open from 8·15 a.m. until 7·20 p.m. Private Boxes, 8·15 a.m. until 7·20 p.m. The Dead Letter Office is open from 9 a.m. until 4·30 p.m.; Saturday, until 1 p.m. The Stamp Saleroom is open from 8·15 a.m. until 7·20 p.m. The Registered Letter and Parcel Post Offices are open from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Mail Notices .- Daily notices notifying arrival and departure of

Mails from Hobart are supplied for £1 per annum.

Holidays.—Christmas Day and Good Friday are observed as close holidays at Post Offices throughout Tasmania. For other gazetted Public Holidays special arrangements (duly adverised) are made at Hobart and Launceston, and the Country Offices observe similar arrangements as on Sundays—viz., are open for an hour most convenient to the residents during the day. No delay in arrival or transmission of Mails takes place, however.

### POSTAGE AND REVENUE STAMPS.

Postage Stamps are issued to the public of the following values:—10s., 5s., 2s. 6d., 1s., 10d., 9d., 8d., 6d., 4d., 3d.,  $2\frac{1}{2}d.$ , 2d., 1d.,  $\frac{1}{2}d.$ 

Envelopes impressed with 2d. Stamps may be obtained in packets of 12 for 2s. 3d.

Registered Envelopes are issued at 3d. each.

Post Cards at 1d. each.

### Impressed Stamps (Revenue).

Documents are impressed at the Stamp Office, Hobart, with Stamps of any value required.

### Acceptance and Promissory Note Forms.

Acceptance Forms bearing Impressed Stamps ranging in values from 3d. to 2s. 6d. may be obtained from any Post Office that is also a Money Order Office; and Acceptance and Promissory Note Forms of any values can be obtained from any Postmaster who will telegraph for same upon application.

### Exchange of Spoiled Acceptance and Promissory Note Forms.

Where a Collector is satisfied that a Stamp has been spoiled, and has not been used for the purpose intended, he may allow other documents to be impressed to value of said stamps, provided such stamp is presented within 60 days of its becoming spoiled.

### Envelopes and Newspaper Wrappers.

One penny and twopenny stamps will be impressed on envelopes supplied by the public for the purpose under the following Regulations:—

1st. Not fewer than 500 envelopes of any one size can be received at any time.

2nd. No envelopes can be received for stamping which are too thin to bear the impression of the die.

3rd. Envelopes provided by the Post Office Department, with the proper stamp thereon, will be substituted for any which may be spoiled in the operation of stamping.

4th. No fee is charged for stamping.

5th. Payment for impressing envelopes to be made in advance.

Half-penny and one penny stamps will be impressed on newspapers wrappers provided for the purpose. The usual commission of 4 per cent. will be allowed on envelopes and wrappers impressed under the regulations to licensed vendors and postmasters.

### REPURCHASE OF POSTAGE STAMPS.

Tasmanian Postage Stamps are repurchased at the General Post Office, Hobart, and the Post Office, Launceston, at a charge of One Shilling in the Pound, or according to the following scale; viz.

For Stamps exceeding 1s. 8d. in value, and not exceeding 3s. 4d... 2d. For Stamps exceeding 3s. 4d. in value, and not exceeding 5s. ... 3d. For Stamps exceeding 5s. in value and not exceeding 6s. 8d. ... 4d. For Stamps exceeding 6s. 8d. in value, and not exceeding 8s. 4d... 5d. For Stamps exceeding 8s. 4d. in value, and not exceeding 10s... 6d. And so on at the rate of One Penny for every 1s. 8d., or portion of 1s. 8d.

Stamps remitted to Government Offices in payment of revenue will be repurchased without a charge for commission, but when such stamps are presented for repurchase they must be accompanied by a Certificate that they were received in payment of Government Revenue.

Stamps will not be repurchased if mutilated, soiled, or otherwise

Application to repurchase must be made to the Officer in Charge of Stamp Sale Room.

### TASMANIAN INLAND PARCEL POST.

### General Regulations.

- 1. Parcel Post business will be transacted at the General Post Office, Hobart, and at the Post Office, Launceston, between the hours of 9 A.M. and 4 P.M. daily, and on Saturday from 9 A.M. to 12 noon; at all other Parcel Post Offices from 8 A.M. until 8 P.M.
- 2. Weight.—The weight of a Parcel must not exceed 7 lbs.
- 3. Size.—Limit of size of Parcel 3 ft. 6 in. in length, or 6 ft. in length and girth combined.

4. Postage.—Postage to be prepaid in Stamps.

The Stamps should be affixed to an adhesive label obtainable at any Parcel Post Office, which will be attached to the Parcel by the Officer receiving the same after he ascertains the weight.

5. Parcels to be prepaid.—No Parcel will be accepted unless the

postage is fully prepaid.

6. Irregularly posted.—Parcels posted in letter boxes, or not duly handed to an Officer of the Department will be regarded as irregularly posted; if not exceeding 3 lbs. in weight they will be forwarded as letters or packets, but if in excess of that weight they will be returned to the sender on payment of Sixpence for each Parcel.

7. Registration .- Parcels may be registered upon payment in Stamps of an additional fee of Threepence, and for an additional Twopence a receipt will be obtained on delivery, which will be

forwarded to the sender by post.

8. Prohibited Articles.-No Parcel may contain a letter, money (coin or bank notes), or consist of or contain two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets of the same or of different descriptions, addressed to different persons at different addresses. This regulation does not prohibit the enclosure of invoices, business cards, or printed circulars. or advertisements, price lists, particulars of contents of or receipted account for such Parcel. No Parcel must bear on the outside any indecent, obscene, profane, or libellous address, signature, marks, words or designs, or contain any indecent or obscene print, photograph. lithograph, writing, engraving, book or card, or other indecent or obscene article; nor must there be enclosed in any Parcel articles of an offensive nature, or liable to sudden combustion or of a dangerous, destructive, or explosive character. Live animals, reptiles, butter, eggs, or anything likely to do injury to persons or parcels, will not be forwarded. Parcels containing fruit, liquids, or semi-liquids, such as jellies, pickles, varnish, paint, medicines, &c., will be accepted conditionally upon their being so securely packed that the contents cannot escape, and the vessels in which they are contained are sufficiently strong to prevent breakage in transmission.

9. Parcels liable to Examination.—All Parcels are liable to examination by Officers authorised in that behalf by the Postmaster-General; and in the event of any prohibited article being found in any Parcel, such Parcel, according to the nature of its contents, may be charged as an insufficiently-paid letter, or be confiscated. Should the contents of any Parcel become offensive or otherwise objectionable while in the possession of the Department, it may be forthwith destroyed. It is not obligatory that Parcels should be open at the ends, but it is advisable that they be not sealed, so that if it be considered necessary they may be conveniently examined.

10.—Offices of Receipt and Despatch.—Parcels will only be received at and despatched from the offices included in the list of Parcel

Post Offices.

11. How addressed .- All Parcels, in addition to the name and address of the person to whom the Parcel is directed, must bear the name and address of the sender legibly written or printed on the left corner of the side bearing the address. This will facilitate the return of undelivered or unclaimed parcels.

12. Deception as to place of posting.—If a Parcel be forwarded under cover to a Post Office, with a request that it may be re-posted, on the request being complied with it will be endorsed with the words, "Received under cover from and re-posted at

13. Re-directed Parcels.—Parcels will be re-directed, and delivered within the Colony, on the written application of the sender or addressee,

on payment of an additional fee of Sixpence for each Parcel.

14. Unclaimed or undelivered Parcels.—Unclaimed or undelivered Parcels will be retained for delivery one calendar month from date of receipt, and at the expiration of that time will be forwarded to the General Post Office, Hobart, whence they will be returned to the senders on payment of a fee of Sixpence each parcel.

15. Return of Parcels (special) if endorsed.—Parcels bearing a request for the return before the period named in the foregoing regulation will be so returned, if such request be endorsed above the name and address of the sender. An additional fee of Sixpence will be required to be paid on each Parcel before delivery to the sender.

16. Refused Parcels.—Parcels, the delivery of which is refused by the addressees, will be at once returned to the sender upon payment of

an additional fee of Sixpence for each Parcel.

17. Delivery.—The addressees of Parcels must take delivery at the Post Office to which the Parcels are addressed. In all cases senders should advise the addressee by post of the despatch of Parcels, so as to ensure prompt delivery.

found in any parcel, such enclosure will be charged full letter rate as from the office of despatch, together with a fine of an amount equal to the amount of postage.

11. When parcels are ready for delivery from the Offices at Hobart or Launceston, or are forwarded for delivery from a Post Office, the

addressees will be advised of the fact.

12. Parcels will be retained at the Post Offices to which they may be sent for delivery one month, when, if unclaimed, they will be retransmitted to the General Post Office, Hobart. But such as may be refused by the addressees will be at once forwarded to that Office.

13. If a parcel cannot be delivered within the time specified above,

the sender will be advised, and asked as to its disposal.

14. Parcels returned by request to another country will be surcharged with the ordinary Parcel Postage. Such surcharge, together with any other charges to which the parcel has become liable, will be collected upon delivery, unless remitted by the sender, or the addressee returning the parcel.

15. Parcels re-directed to another country with which arrangements have been made for the exchange of Postal Parcels are, if the charges be not previously paid, subjected by the delivery office to a charge, to be paid by the addressees, representing the rate of postage from the

office of re-direction to the place of delivery.

16. Parcels which cannot be delivered, or re-directed or returned to the sender, will be sent back to the country whence they came.

Norn.—Parcels from Places degond Tasmania.—Parcels sent from London, or viâ London, are not transmitted by the same route as ordinary correspondence, but are shipped in Bragiana and brought in the vessels to Melbourne and thence to Hobart or Lanneeston, consequently they are not due in Tasmania until at least a week after arrival of letters despatched same time. Parcels from India are not sent overland from Adelaide, as is the case with letters, but are in like manner brought in the ships to Melbourne and thence to Tasmania. Latters found in parcels will, according to Regulation 10, be taxed letter rate as from office of despatch, together with a line equal to the amount of postage.

If the driver of any mail coach or other vehicle or any person in charge of any mail loiters on the road or wilfully misspends or loses time, thus retarding delivery of such mail, such person is liable to a penalty of £5. (Sec. 99.)

Any person wilfully obstructing or retarding the conveyance of any

mail is liable to a penalty of £50. (Sec. 100.)

If any person employed in carrying a mail loses the same whilst in his charge, whether such mail is recovered or not, he shall be liable to a

penalty of £25. (Sec. 101.)

Any person who fraudulently retains or wilfully secretes, keeps, or detains, or who, after demand is made by an officer of the Post Office, neglects or refuses to deliver up any letter or packet forwarded by post which has been wrongfully delivered and which is in the custody of such person, is liable to a penalty of £50. (Sec. 102.)

If any person opens or permits to be opened, detained, or delayed (except as allowed by the Post Office Act) any letter or packet after the same has been delivered into any Post Office or into the house of any person employed under the said Act, without the authority of the person to whom such letter or packet is addressed, he shall be liable to a penalty of £50. (Sec. 103.)

Any person destroying the property of the Post Office, or assisting to destroy such property, is liable to a penalty of £50. (Sec. 104.)

Any disorderly person loitering or stopping opposite to or on the premises of a Post Office is liable to a penalty of £5. (Sec. 105.)

Any person unlawfully entering any Post Office, or upon the premises belonging or attached to any Post Office, is liable to a penalty of £5. (Sec. 106.)

Any person who puts into any Post Office any letter, packet, or newspaper bearing an obscene, profane, or libellous address or signature, is liable to a penalty of £50. (Sec. 107.)

### TELEGRAPH. ELECTRIC

### REGULATIONS.

1. All telegrams must be written distinctly with ink, on forms provided for that purpose, the signature of the sender in each case being required in authentication of the message; but all telegrams, whether written on the proper form or on plain paper, will be considered as presented for transmission under the conditions contained in the following regulations.

2. In order to prevent errors in the transmission of telegrams, all words must be written in full, and no abbreviations will be allowed that are not in general use, and in accordance with the usage of the language. All numbers should be written in words in full, and not in figures.

3. As a general rule all messages must be prepaid, except in the case of replies to messages on which the words "reply paid" have been written, or where special arrangements have been made for payment by receiver; but in all cases the sender will be held responsible for the cost of the message should payment be refused by addressee.

4. Messages will be delivered free within one mile of the office. For greater distances, porterage, or, where necessary, cab or boat hire will be charged, and must be prepaid or guaranteed. Where a special messenger has to be employed the department will make the best arrangements it can, but the telegram will only be so forwarded at the sender's risk and cost, and should no messenger be procurable the tele-

gram will be posted at the option of the sender.

5. With respect to cypher messages, every message in secret language, or consisting of words in any admitted language (English, French, German, Italian, Dutch, Portuguese, Spanish, and Latin) having no connective meaning, groups of letters or figures, shall be regarded as a cypher message, and be subject to an additional charge of 50 per cent.; and in a message containing one or more words in cypher every such word shall be counted as two words, and the extra charge be added to the minimum rate for a message, provided that such extra charge shall not exceed 50 per cent. on the ordinary rate which would be payable on account of the said telegram. Groups of five letters or five figures shall count as one cypher word.

6. To facilitate delivery, care should be taken to give full name and

address of person to whom the telegram is addressed.

7. The sender of any telegram can have the telegram repeated back to him by the office to which the message is addressed on payment of an additional half-rate.

8. The Government will not be responsible for mistakes in the transmission of unrepeated messages, from whatever cause they may arise, nor for any delay in the transmission and delivery, nor for non-transmission or non-delivery of any message.

9. Except in cases of emergency, illness, &c., or messages on the service of the State, or urgent messages on which double rates have been paid, messages will be transmitted in the order in which they are

### BRITISH AND FOREIGN BUSINESS.

Rules and Regulations as to the Acceptance and Transmission of Telegrams.

Note.—The expression "European correspondence" in the following rules applies to telegrams exchanged between European Countries only, and the term "Extra-European correspondence" to telegrams exchanged between Countries beyond Europe, either with each other or with Europe.

1. Telegrams are accepted for transmission by the Companies subject to the conditions endorsed upon their forms, to which special attention is directed, and subject also to the rules and regulations of the International Telegraph Convention in force for the time being.

### Mode of Writing and Acceptance of Telegrams.

2. All telegrams should be legibly written.

3. Telegrams may be written in plain language, in code language, or in secret language (language chiffré).

4. Telegrams in plain language must present a clear meaning in any one of the languages allowed to be used for telegraphic purposes.

5. By code language is understood the employment of words which are to be found in standard dictionaries, but not arranged to form intelligible phrases.

6. Telegrams in code language may contain words not exceeding in length ten letters, belonging to any one or to all of the following languages, but to no other, viz.:—English, French, German, Italian, Dutch, Portuguese, Spanish, and Latin. Words containing more than ten letters in code telegrams will be treated as groups of letters, and be charged at cipher rates.

7. Proper names of persons and places in the text of code messages must be used only in their natural sense.

8. The companies have the right to ask for the production of code vocabularies should any word or words in a telegram appear open to question, in order to verify their authenticity.

9. Secret language telegrams may be composed of ciphers or secret letters, or they may contain series of groups of figures or letters, the signification of which shall be unknown to the sending station, or they may be written in languages not admitted under paragraphs 6 and 7.

10. The text of secret language telegrams may be wholly secret or partially so. In the latter case, the secret passages must be placed between signs of parenthesis, to separate them from the ordinary text which precedes or follows. The secret passages must be composed exclusively of letters of the alphabet, or exclusively of figures.

11. For Extra-European correspondence secret letters are not admitted.

OBSERVATION.—Under the International Telegraph Convention, code words containing more than ten letters cannot be accepted in code telegrams, but in order to avoid the inconvenience which a prohibition of them would occasion, it was decided by the Central Telegraph Administration at Berne, that words exceeding ten letters in length should be treated as groups of letters, and be charged for at the rate of three letters to a word in telegrams subject to Extra-European rules, and at the rate of five letters to a word in telegrams subject to European rules. This decision applies also to proper names which are not used in their natural sense. Code telegrams may contain one or more passages in plain language, but the passage or phrase must be intelligible on the face of it, as for instance, "Imperatrice arrived," which would be chargeable in Extra-European telegrams as three words, and in European telegrams as two words, or "Pay Majoribanks hundred pounds," chargeable in Extra-European telegrams as five words, and in European telegrams as four words. It must be understood from this that an isolated word, although used in its natural sense, does not constitute a passage in plain language under the Convention. An isolated proper name in a code telegram may, however, on the declaration of the sender that it is used in its natural sense, be accepted and charged for according to the Rules applicable to plain language.

Registration of Addresses.

12. The companies will, at any of their stations, register free of charge the names and addresses of firms receiving messages, so that this information may be given in two words, but not less than two words, thus, "Hercules, London." This registration can be effected only at the station to which the telegrams are to be addressed, and not by letter from England to Australasia, or vice versá.

13. Only one registered code address can be allowed to a firm or a company for each correspondent. In all cases where merchants or others desire to register a code address a proper name or a dictionary word must be chosen, such combinations as "Cornmart" for Cornelius Mart, "Granotel" for Grand Hotel, &c., being neither proper names nor dictionary words cannot be accepted for registration, nor can such irregular combinations be admitted in the text of telegrams.

14. The name of the sender of a message need not necessarily be transmitted. Every message form, however, must be signed either by the sender or his representative.

### Counting and Charging of Telegrams.

15. Messages are charged according to a tariff per word, including the names and addresses of the sender and receiver.

16. In European telegrams the name of the office of origin, the date, and hour of departure will be inserted on the form delivered to the

17. The maximum length of a single word in International telegrams in plain language is fixed at ten letters, any additional letters being counted and charged for as extra words, at the rate of ten letters to the word.

in the delivery of a message beyond the receiving station. He is also responsible for the consequences of giving an incomplete or incorrect address.

Repeated or Collated Telegrams.

36. To ensure greater accuracy in transmission, the sender may have his message repeated from station to station on payment of one-quarter the usual rates additional.

37. The words "repetition paid," or the abbreviation "TC," must be inscribed immediately before the receiver's address; and are charged

Rectifying Telegrams and Service Taxes.

38. The receiver of a message suspecting an error in transmission may have the whole or any part repeated on payment of the cost of a message demanding the repetition, and a reply containing as many words as are required to be repeated. The sender can also have the whole or any portion of his message repeated on payment of the price of the telegram he forwards and of the reply if one be required.

39. The demand for repetition must be made within 72 hours after receipt or despatch of the telegram, and should be in the form prescribed by the International Telegraph Convention Service Regula-

tion 24.

"Calcutta from London ST" (these words are not charged for).

"RP. 4" (representing reply paid four words).

"Twenty-sixth" (date of message to be repeated), "Brown" receiver's name) "Repeat first, fourth, ninth" (words of the text of the telegram to be repeated), or

"Repeat word" (or words) "after\_

The reply will be worded as follows:—

"London from Calcutta ST" (service words not charged for).

"Brown" (receiver's name) albatross scrutiny commune.

Between stations supplied with the "Repetition Code Book" the repetition and reply may be sent in the form therein indicated.

The charge for at least two words in the reply must be prepaid even if only one word has to be repeated; and unless the sender indicate in his inquiry that a less number of words has been paid for, it will be

assumed that a reply of ten words has been prepaid.

40. These charges will be at once refunded if the repetition asked for proves that the original message has been seriously mutilated in transmission. In case some of the words asked to be repeated are shown to have been correctly transmitted the cost of the words employed to obtain the repetition of such words in both message and reply will be deducted from the amount refunded. No reimbursement will be made when an error has arisen from illegible handwriting on the part of the sender, nor when the repetition is obtained direct instead of by means of an official service telegram. The cost of the original message will not be refunded.

40A. Should the sender of a message require to send a service to alter or complete the address of his telegram, the preamble to the service should be in the form prescribed by Service Regulation 23 of the Berlin Convention, thus—" Calcutta from Adelaide," the name of both sending and receiving station being transmitted free.

### Acknowledgment of Receipt.

41. The date and hour at which a message has been delivered will be notified to the sender by wire if he inserts the words "acknowledgment paid," or the abbreviation "CR," immediately before the receiver's address, paying the charge for ten words.

### Prepaid Replies.

42. The reply to a message can be prepaid, the sender determining its length, which must not exceed thirty words. The indication "reply prepaid," or "RP," will have to be inserted before the receiver's address and paid for; this indication will represent the prepayment of a reply of ten words. If a longer or shorter reply be expected, the number of words prepaid for the reply must be added thus, "RP, fifteen," or "RP, five," this instruction counting as two words.

43. The sum prepaid for reply will be held for a period of six weeks at the disposal of the receiver of the original message to cover the cost

of his reply.

44. Should the reply contain more words than have been indicated as

prepaid, the sender of the reply must pay the excess charge.

45. If the original message cannot be delivered, or if the receiver refuses to send a reply, the delivery or terminal office will immediately advise the sending station by a telegram, which takes the place of a reply. If the receiver of an International telegram does not wish to send a reply he may, within six weeks after date, return the message form or other document to the delivery office, with a request that the amount prepaid for the reply shall be refunded to the sender. In this case the delivery office will notify the original station by post, and the sum deposited will be returned to the sender of the original message. If fewer words are sent in the reply to an International telegram than have been prepaid, the difference will not be refunded.

### Multiple Messages.

46. Messages may be addressed to several receivers in the same place, or to the same receiver at several residences in the same place.

47. Telegrams addressed to several receivers or to the same receiver in different towns are, in all cases, charged as so many separate tele-

grams.

48. Telegrams addressed to several persons in the same town or the same person at several addresses in the same town, with or without reexpedition by post will bear only a single charge, with an extra tax of fivepence for every copy not exceeding 100 words, and fivepence additional for every extra 100 words.

49. The sender of a multiple telegram may prepay the reply or replies which he wishes to receive by inserting the words "reply prepaid" or "RP" before the address of those receivers from whom he

expects a reply.

Multiple messages are not accepted for North or South America. Messages by Wire and Post.

50. Telegrams for places beyond the limits of the telegraph system must bear the indication "express" or "post paid" in the following

2. In other parts of the colony they will be supplied on terms to be mutually agreed upon, but at not less than £1 10s. per mile, and 7s. 6d. for each additional quarter of a mile or fraction thereof.

3. As a rule, the agreement must be for a period of three years, and will be terminable at any time after the end of that period on giving

three months' notice.

4. The renter of any private line will not be allowed to use such line for other than his own business. Any breach of this rule will involve the removal of the line and instruments, without prejudice to the right of the Government to claim the rent for the remainder of the term.

5. The renter of a private line may provide his own apparatus and instruments, or the Government will provide and maintain apparatus and instruments at an annual charge to be paid yearly, in advance, of £1 10s. for each set of apparatus or instruments, comprising two telephone receivers, one transmitter, call-bell, and battery. The renter will be held liable for all damage beyond ordinary wear and tear.

6. Should a renter of a private line change his office or residence, he will be required to pay such portion of the cost of altering the line, &c.

as may be determined by the Superintendent of Telegraphs.

7. The length of a private line shall be determined by the shortest ordinary route between the termini.

### Instructions respecting the Working of the Telephone EXCHANGES.

The strictest observance of the following directions will greatly facilitate the prompt and efficient working of the Telephone Exchange:-

1. Have the name and number of the subscriber ready before you call the Exchange; this saves your time and the time of the operator.

2. Give these immediately you are answered, then hang up telephone, and wait for the next ring, which will be the reply ring of the subscriber you want. Do not ask the operators any questions outside their business; if you delay them with questions they cannot attend to their work; confine yourself strictly to the name and number of the subscriber you want.

3. When connected do not again use your bell (except to ring off); should you do so you will be immediately disconnected. If you leave your telephone to seek information, ask the other end to wait and listen; on return speak direct; do not ring or you will be disconnected. If it will take some time to obtain the information it will be better to ring off and call the Exchange again when ready, so as to avoid keeping the other subscriber waiting.

4. Only ring off when finished with a subscriber; do not delay, as you may be wanted by some one else. The operation of ringing when finished causes a shutter to fall; this is the only means the operators have of knowing when you have finished.

5. When called by the Exchange give a short ring before taking the telephone off to speak.

6. Speak into your transmitter in a clear even tone; unless you do this you will not be understood properly. If you talk in an imperfect or in an unintelligible way the transmitter will do the same.

7. For talking the switch is opened by the action of taking off the receiver. When finished always hang your receiving telephone on the

switch of the call-box; otherwise you cannot be rung up.

8. Complaints in reference to lines or instruments should be communicated to the Superintendent of Telegraphs.
